



# SUSTAINABILITY GUIDE



SOME COMMUNITIES RULES AND GUIDELINES MAY VARY

## Recycling

All material should be placed loose in the recycling cart.

### Paper



Newspaper, office paper, magazines, junk mail, cardboard/paperboard boxes broken down.

### Metal



Aluminum, steel and tin cans – empty and rinsed.

### Glass



Clear and colored bottles and jars – empty and rinsed, can leave lids on.

### Plastic



Bottles, jugs and containers/tubs – empty and rinsed with caps/lids on. Examples: water/pop bottles, milk jugs and detergent containers, the containers would be like butter tubs, yogurt, sour cream, cottage cheese, etc.

### Consumer Packaging



Egg cartons, broth containers, coffee cups, milk cartons – empty and rinsed.



Not sure if its recyclable?  
*When in doubt, throw it out.*

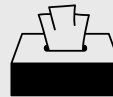
## Trash

**Toss it in the trash!**

Styrofoam, broken glass.



Soiled paper products such as used tissues, napkins & paper towel.
